DANIELS: ...Regarding the past, what's done is done and we cannot go back in time to change it nor can we change the natural laws...which govern the way things operate in our universe.

GOLDFARB: Well, look, if we cannot change the past and the laws of nature and if, according to determinism, what we do now is a necessary consequence of the past and the laws of nature, then, according to determinism...then it ultimately follows that if determinism is true then there is nothing we can do now to change the fact that our present actions occur.
